## West Virginia at the 2010 NCAA Southeast Regional Championships

Date: Saturday, April 10, 2010

Location: WVU Coliseum, Morgantown, W.Va.

Time: 6 p.m.

History: WVU is making its 27th regional championships appearance

Preview: WVU (19-9, 12-2 EAGL) returns to the gym following a two-week break and plays host to the 2010 NCAA Southeast Championships. The Mountaineers qualified for their 27th regional appearance as the No. 6 seed.

Stanford and Michigan, tied at No. 6 in this week's GymInfo Poll, enter the championships as the top two seeds. No. 18-ranked Southern Utah earned the No. 3 seed, while EAGL foe NC State, the league's runner-up, was seeded at No. 4. Kent State rounds out the pack at No. 5.

WVU is 2-2 against the field, with wins over NCSU and KSU, and losses to UM and NCSU.

With more than 600 career wins, 35 years in the gym, 10 conference champions, 31 trips to regionals and four trips to nationals, West Virginia University coach Linda Burdette-Good has sealed her legacy as one of the most influential collegiate women's gymnastics coaches of all time.

One of the hardest-working coaches is enjoying the fruit of her work. In her 36th season, Burdette-Good has molded the Mountaineers into national prominence.

The 1996, 1998 and 2001 East Atlantic Gymnastics League (EAGL) Coach of the Year is one of the most respected coaches in the country. She also was the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year in 1986 and 1989. In addition to those accolades, she was the 1981 and 1982 regional AIAW Coach of the Year. In 1982, Burdette-Good guided the Mountaineers to a third-place finish at the AIAW national championship.

She served on the six member NCAA Women's Gymnastics Committee and was the chair of the NCAA Regional Advisory Committee. Burdette-Good also was the driving force behind the foundation of the EAGL and is that conference's chair.

But Burdette-Good's top priority is her nationally ranked gymnastics team. The only WVU coach to earn 600 career wins with a Mountaineer team, she eclipsed the benchmark on Jan. 31, 2009, with victories over George Washington and Rutgers at the WVU Coliseum. Burdette-Good previously surpassed former baseball coach Dale Ramsburg's mark with her 541st career win in 2006.

With 2008's 23-8 record, Burdette-Good has guided 14 teams to 20-win seasons since 1981. Since her first 20-win season in 1981, none of her teams have posted a losing record and just four had winning percentages less than .600.

Mehgan Morris, the 2009 EAGL Outstanding Senior Gymnast, became the 17th Mountaineer, and 13th all-arounder, to qualify individually for the NCAA Championship under Burdette-Good's guidance in 2009. The Mountaineers finished 15-8 overall, 10-2 in conference, second at the EAGL Championship and fourth at the NCAA Southeast Regional, the squad's 31st championship appearance. Four gymnasts earned six EAGL titles, matching a program-best mark first set in 1998. Additionally, WVU was ranked in the Top 25 of the GymInfo Poll each week.

Including this year, her 36th at West Virginia, Burdette-Good boasts a career record of 631-253-4 and a .713 career winning percentage.

Burdette-Good led her sixth squad in 13 years to an EAGL Championship title in 2008, as the Mountaineers laid claim to the conference championship with a first place finish at the WVU Coliseum. WVU finished fourth at the Southeast Regional.

In 2007, Burdette-Good guided her team to a school-record 28 wins, including 17 against EAGL foes, as her team narrowly missed a trip to nationals after hosting the Southeast Regional.

On the brink of yet another conference championship and trip to regionals, Burdette-Good notched her 500th career win in the 2004 regular season finale with a home victory over Bowling Green on March 13, 2004.

Despite having just two seasons under .500 in her career, Burdette-Good had to provide a jolt to the program following a 15-12 record in 2003. The team responded by living up to its own lofty standards. In 2004, Burdette-Good and the Mountaineers made their 26th appearance at regionals in 27 years and won the EAGL championship for a league-record fifth time with a meet-record score of 197.05. The future of the program also seemed intact with star freshman and EAGL Rookie of the Year Janae Cox becoming the ninth WVU gymnast in school history to qualify for NCAA Championships as an individual.

Cox, who also qualified in 2005 and 2007, was the first Burdette-Good-coached gymnast at nationals since 2002, when TeShawne Jackson qualified after leading the Mountaineers to a 22-6 record and a second-place EAGL finish.

Nine seasons ago was one of the best ever for Burdette-Good's Mountaineer gymnastics program. Three different Mountaineers scored perfect 10s, with sophomore Jackson scoring five by herself, including two meets with 10s on vault and floor. The 17th-ranked Mountaineers regained the EAGL championship after a two-year drought without the title. While the team did not qualify for the NCAA

Championships, two of Burdette-Good's charges earned the right to compete (Dinorh Boyd as an all-arounder, Kristen Macrie on floor).

Having entrenched her Mountaineers on the national gymnastics scene, the 1995 NCAA Southeast Regional Coach of the Year has guided her team to a steady stream of winning seasons, conference championships, NCAA Southeast Regionals, and in 1995, led WVU to its first-ever NCAA Championships appearance.

In 1999, after a 19-7 overall record and a sixth-place finish at the EAGL meet at Maryland, the Mountaineers hosted the NCAA Region 6 Championships, finishing second to No. 2 Alabama and earning the Mountaineers their second trip to the NCAA Championships.

The 2000 season was arguably Burdette-Good's most challenging, yet most rewarding as a coach for West Virginia. With the WVU Coliseum closed for asbestos abatement and some injuries to key contributors, the Mountaineers could have struggled. But instead WVU turned in three of the top four team scores in school history at Morgantown High and advanced to the NCAA Championships for the third time in program history.

The Mountaineers have averaged 20 wins per season since 1990, while registering consecutive 20-win seasons from 1990-92. Included in that stretch was a then school-record 26 wins, and its first Atlantic 10 title during the 1992 campaign. Burdette-Good guided the Mountaineers to three straight EAGL championships from 1996-98 and seven consecutive conference titles overall from 1992-98.

Since the NCAA incorporated gymnastics as a sport in 1983, Burdette-Good-coached teams have qualified for 25 of the last 26 regional meets and the national championships three times.

Burdette-Good is responsible for mentoring the best gymnast in school history, Kristin Quackenbush, who became the school's first AAI American Award winner and a six-time NCAA All-American. She holds or shares school records on the vault, floor and all-around, and owns five career perfect 10s. Burdette-Good's first two NCAA All-Americans came in 1994 as Quackenbush (vault and floor) and Lajuanda Moody (beam) earned second-team honors in Salt Lake City.

Burdette-Good's gymnasts have fared well in the classroom as well. Sixty-seven have earned NACGC/W scholastic All-America status, including five for the 2009 squad.

Burdette-Good guided the Mountaineers to their best season ever in 1982 when they won the EIAIW championship and then finished third at the AIAW national championship. It also was during that season that Shari Retton became the Mountaineers' first All-American. For these accomplishments, Burdette-Good was honored as the EIAIW Coach of the Year.

While a member of the Atlantic 10 from 1983-95, Burdette-Good guided the Mountaineers to four conference championships (1992-95) and never finished lower than third in any year. Burdette-Good was honored after the 1986 and 1989 seasons as the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year.

Her gymnasts have been no strangers to conference laurels, either. Burdette-Good has coached 55 conference champions and 116 all-conference selections, including 17 in 2009. Burdette-Good also honed the skills of Quackenbush and Umme Salim, who both garnered EAGL Outstanding Senior and Gymnast of the Year honors. She has guided Kelly Foley and Kristen Macrie, who was the 2000 and 2002 EAGL Outstanding Senior Gymnast of the Year, respectively, and Boyd, the 2001 EAGL Gymnast of the Year. In 2003, Halovanic was named the EAGL Scholar Athlete of the Year, and in 2004 Cox was named EAGL Rookie of the Year. Cox would finish off her career with the 2007 Gymnast of the Year and Most Outstanding Senior awards before earning All-America honors on floor at nationals. Burdette-Good also guided Morris to 2009 EAGL Outstanding Senior Gymnast and 2006 EAGL Rookie of the Year honors. Since joining the EAGL, 56 Mountaineers have earned EAGL all-academic recognition 616 times. Burdette-Good also coached seven Atlantic 10 Gymnasts of the Year, five A-10 Seniors of the Year, five league freshmen of the year and seven of her gymnasts also earned Atlantic 10 All-Academic honors.

Burdette-Good is married to Lee Good and the couple resides in Morgantown. The couple also has a home in Uniontown, Ohio. Burdette-Good has one daughter, Anna Burdette, a WVU graduate, and one grandson, Ashton.

## Sweet 600!

With victories over Rutgers and George Washington on Jan. 31, 2009, Coach Burdette-Good became the first WVU coach to earn 600 wins with a Mountaineer team. Only current men's basketball coach Bob Huggins (670-241) has more overall wins.

## The Last Time Out....

WVU scored 195.075 and finished in third place at the 2010 EAGL Championship, on March 27, in Durham, N.H.

North Carolina won its fourth EAGL title with 196.025 points. NC State finished second with 195.7 points. Host New Hampshire scored 194.7 and finished in fourth place, while Pitt finished in fifth place with a 194.4 team total.

The Mountaineers (19-9, 12-2 EAGL) earned their second-best score of the season. The squad has finished in the top three at the league championship in nine of the last 11 years.

WVU finished third on beam (48.7) and vault (48.9), and fourth on bars (48.775) and floor (48.7).

Junior Amy Bieski tallied 39.1 points and finished in seventh place.

Sophomore Tina Maloney matched a season high and finished eighth on vault with 9.825 points.

Junior Alysha Pretzello paced WVU on bars with a career-best 9.825, while senior Kiersten Spoerke finished sixth on beam with a team-best 9.8. Bieski also scored 9.8 on floor, a team-best mark.

## Earning Respect

Though they finished the 2009 season ranked No. 25, the Mountaineers opened the 2010 campaign ranked No. 21 in the GymInfo Preseason Coaches Poll.

WVU was the only EAGL team to earn a nod on the preseason poll. Seven of WVU's 2010 opponents also earned rankings – No. 11 Penn State, No. 12 Michigan, No. 15 Nebraska, No. 17 Denver, No. 18 Ohio State, No. 20 Arizona and No. 24 Michigan State. Five additional opponents received votes.

The Mountaineers opened the 2009 season ranked No. 24. The team did not relinquish its ranking throughout the year, and reached as high as No. 18 twice.

## We Must Protect This House

The West Virginia University gymnastics team plays host to the 2010 NCAA Southeast Regional at the WVU Coliseum on Saturday, April 10.

The meet marks the seventh time the Mountaineers have been host of an NCAA Regional since 1983. WVU last welcomed a regional to the Coliseum in 2007, when it finished third to UCLA and LSU. All-American Janáe Cox advanced from the regional to the NCAA Championship as an individual all-around qualifier.

The WVU Coliseum is famous for an exciting regional, as 3,074 fans watched the Bruins advance in 2007. The largest crowd to attend a regional in Morgantown was 3,492 in 1994, which is also the largest gymnastics crowd in Coliseum history. This year's seniors are the only holdovers from that hosting WVU squad.

This season's regional qualification is the Mountaineers' 27th.

## EAGL Honors Mountaineer Quartet

Four Mountaineers earned a collective nine all-EAGL honors at the 2010 EAGL Championship banquet on March 26 in Portsmouth, N.H.

Junior Amy Bieski paced the pack with five honors. The Nanticoke, Pa., native earned first team floor and all-around awards and second team vault, bars and beam honors. Bieski owns seven career first team awards.

Sophomore Nicole Roach was named to the all-EAGL bars first team for the second-straight season.

Senior Chelsi Tabor earned second team vault and beam awards. The beam honor was a career-first for the Beckley, W.Va., native; she had previously been named to the vault first team in 2008 and 2009.

Sophomore Tina Maloney was the fourth Mountaineer honored and was named to the floor second team. The award was the Hanover, Ind., native's second of her career and first on the apparatus.

## EAGL Reign

The Mountaineers have proven their dominance in the EAGL Conference, winning six titles (1996-98, 2001, 2004, 2008) throughout the league's 15-year history.

WVU won its most recent championship in 2008, edging NC State by 1.025 points to take the trophy. The Mountaineers totaled 196.05 points in front of a home crowd, as the squad hosted its second EAGL Championship.

The Mountaineers have never gone more than four years without winning an EAGL Championship.

## WVU Enjoys EAGL Success

The Mountaineers concluded the 2009 season with a 10-2 conference record. The team breezed past its league competition in 2008 en route to a perfect 16-0 record. WVU recorded nine victories over EAGL foes in the regular season before taking the league crown with seven additional wins at the 2008 EAGL Championships.

WVU owns a 239-60-3 (.796) all-time record against current conference opponents. Additionally, the Mountaineers own winning records against each EAGL squad. WVU went 17-2 against conference opponents in 2007, including an 11-1 mark prior to the conference championships.

## ***Leadership by Committee***

The Mountaineers have selected three team captains for the 2010 season – senior Ashley Wilson and juniors Amy Bieski and Alysha Pretzello.

Wilson, a St. Albans, W.Va., native, captained the WVU squad with Meghan Morris in 2009.

## ***Seniors Set for One Last Stand***

Four Mountaineers will don the Old Gold and Blue for the final time this season – Shelly Purkat, Kiersten Spoerke, Chelsi Tabor and Ashley Wilson.

The foursome has already put together brilliant careers at WVU. In total, the quartet has six all-EAGL honors, and Purkat (beam) and Tabor (vault) each earned their first league titles last season.

Since the class arrived in 2007, WVU has won its sixth EAGL title (2008), accumulated a record of 85-34 and finished two seasons with 20-plus victories (2007, '08).



## ***Returns Ready, Willing and Able***

Fourteen Mountaineers return from a 2009 WVU team that went 15-8, finished second in the EAGL with a 10-2 record and placed fourth at the NCAA Southeast Regional.

Though the Mountaineers lose NCAA Championship qualifier and 1,600-plus career point scorer Meghan Morris, seven gymnasts return with experience in 20-plus career meets.

At the top of the list is senior Shelly Purkat with 50 career meets competed in, the sixth-best mark in program history; the Edina, Minn., native has competed in all but one meet in her four years at WVU. Classmates Chelsi Tabor and Kiersten Spoerke trail Purkat and have competed in 44 and 42 meets, respectively.

Junior Amy Bieski is the only returning Mountaineer with all-around experience, having competed in 34-of-38 career meets as an all-arounder.

## ***Making the Grade***

Coach Linda Burdette-Good believes that her Mountaineers must work hard in the gym and in the classroom.

WVU's effort with the books is evident each season, and last year was no different, as 14 Mountaineers were named to the all-EAGL Academic Team. Additionally, five Mountaineers were named National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches/Women (NACGC/W) Scholastic All-Americans: Heather Izer, Kiersten Spoerke, Shelly Purkat, Stephanie Keaton and Jenn Sharon. The honor was the third-straight for Izer and Spoerke, the second for Purkat and Keaton and the first for Sharon. Additionally, Keaton was one of 67 gymnasts to earn the honor with a 4.0 GPA.

Burdette-Good has coached 67 NACGC/W Scholastic All-Americans throughout her 36-year career.

The Mountaineers ranked 29th overall for the second-consecutive year with a cumulative team grade point average (GPA) of 3.3254.

## ***Looking Back at 2009***

Perseverance was the key to WVU's 2009 season, as the Mountaineers concluded the year, Burdette-Good's 35th, at 15-8, second in the EAGL with a 10-2 record and fourth at the NCAA Southeast Regional Championship.

The Mountaineers came within 0.2 points of winning back-to-back EAGL titles, as WVU finished behind host NC State, 195.7-195.5, at the league championship in Raleigh, N.C.

Despite the second-place finish, the Mountaineers took home six individual titles, matching a program-best mark. WVU has had a league champion in 12 of the EAGL's 14 years.

Meghan Morris, the 2009 EAGL Outstanding Senior Gymnast, led the way with three wins, finishing first overall with 39.3 points; she was the first Mountaineer to win the league's all-around crown since Janée Cox did so in 2005. Additionally, she was only the second Mountaineer to earn three conference titles at one championship, as Umme Salim also won three events in 1998. Morris also successfully defended her bars and floor titles.

Junior Shelly Purkat tied for first on beam with 9.875 points, while classmate Chelsi Tabor and freshman Tina Maloney tied for first on vault with matching 9.90s. The duo was the second WVU pair to tie for the EAGL vault title.

The Mountaineers concluded their season with a fourth-place showing at the 2009 NCAA Southeast Regional. Though the team finished below its goal of qualifying for the national championship, the Mountaineers did recover from an early sixth-place deficit and finished better than EAGL foes North Carolina and NC State.

Morris became the 17th Mountaineer to individually qualify for the NCAA National Championship with a fifth-place all-around finish. She capped off her brilliant WVU career with an 18th-place finish in the championship's first preliminary session.



## The Sprint to the Top

With 38.85 points in the 11th meet of her junior season, Amy Bieski made the jump onto the WVU all-time career points list. The Nanticoke, Pa., native now owns 1,435.8 career points and ranks 17th all-time.

Needing only 30.45 points, Bieski surpassed the 1,000-point plateau with a 38.275 showing at Michigan State in the Mountaineers' season-opener on Jan. 8.

Current volunteer assistant Meghan Morris broke onto the list last season and concluded her career in 12th place with 1,623.975 points. All-American Janáe Cox (2004-07) sits at the top with a program-best 2,070.65 career points.

## Bieski Belongs with the Best

As the lone Mountaineer all-rounder, junior Amy Bieski has multiple opportunities each meet to showcase her talents. The Nanticoke, Pa., native took full advantage of the center stage at WVU's home opener on Jan. 24, scoring 39.15 points to finish first overall; additionally, she placed in the top three of each event and won bars with a season-best 9.775 score.

Bieski followed that performance with a 39.025 showing on Feb. 5 against Michigan, and a season-best 39.25 combined score on Feb. 12 against Ohio State and on Feb. 20 at Penn State. Bieski returned to winning form on March 6 with a 39.1, first-place showing against Bowling Green, and followed that with a 39.125 first-place finish at UNC. She went on to finish seventh overall at the 2010 EAGL Championship with 39.1 points. She has tallied 39.0-plus points in seven of the last 10 meets.

Bieski is now in seventh place for the most career 39.0-plus all-around scores.

Strong in the classroom each season, the 2010 WVU gymnastics team is no different, as a program-best 15 Mountaineers were named to the EAGL all-Academic Team.

Seniors Shelly Purkat, Kiersten Spoerke and Ashley Wilson earned the award for the fourth-straight year. Additionally, classmate Chelsi Tabor was named to the team for the third year.

Four juniors earned the team honor for the third time: Amy Bieski, Naja Johnson, Stephanie Keaton and Faye Meaden. Classmates Emily Kerwin and Jessica Young also earned the honor for the first and second time, respectively.

Sophomores Tina Maloney and Jenn Sharon were each recognized for the second time, while freshmen Hailey Fairchild, Arlene Hathaway and Alaska Richardson all earned their first honor.



## Vault Queen

With a 2009 EAGL vault title to support her skill level, senior Chelsi Tabor is arguably one of the best vaulters in the league.

Tabor set new standards for herself on March 6, sticking a near-perfect vault and scoring a career-best 9.95. She became the first Mountaineer to earn the score since 2004. Tabor had not scored better than 9.9 since achieving a 9.925 score on Feb. 15, 2008.

She followed that performance with a first-place, 9.9 showing in the final home dual-meet of her career on March 19. She currently ranks second in the EAGL, 47th in the nation, with a 9.855 RQS.

After earning 9.7 in the Jan. 8 season opener, the Beckley, W.Va., native scored winning marks of 9.8 at Pitt on Jan. 16 and 9.875 in WVU's first home meet on Jan. 24. She made it three-for-three at Maryland, scoring 9.85 and finishing first overall, and returned to the podium on Feb. 12 against Ohio State with a 9.8 first-place finish. Tabor tied for fourth at Penn State with a 9.825 score on Feb. 20, and she also tallied 9.825 points and tied for first place at UNC on March 13.

Tabor had her most prolific season to date as a junior. Not only did she finish first in the league, an honor she shared with teammate Tina Maloney, but her final RQS of 9.875 also ranked second in the EAGL, fifth in the Southeast region and 29th in the nation.

With seven 9.9-plus scores to her name Tabor ranks sixth on the vault all-time list.

## WVU Shines at Pink Meet

The Mountaineers annually turn-up their effort at their Pink Meet, and this season was no exception.

WVU soundly defeated Ohio State, 195.65-192.8, on Feb. 12 at the WVU Coliseum. The Mountaineers' winning score was a season-high and matched the 28th-best score in program history.

The squad defeated the Buckeyes on each event with season-high scores. Additionally, WVU's 49.075 floor score was its first 49.0-plus mark of the year.

In total, seven Mountaineers set or matched eight career-best scores against the Buckeyes.

## Balancing Hopes on Beam

Trailing Penn State, 146.65-146.45, through three rotations, the Mountaineers were poised to make a comeback on Feb. 20 at University Park, Pa.

Though WVU fell short of the win, it wasn't due to lack of effort, as the squad opened its final rotation on beam with three 9.8-plus marks.

Freshman Chelsea Goldschrafe built the momentum fast, tallying a career-best 9.85 score in the leadoff position. Senior Chelsi Tabor and sophomore Nicole Roach followed and each scored 9.8; the mark was a career-best for Roach and tied Tabor's career-high. Junior Amy Bieski also scored 9.8.

Goldschrafe finished second overall, while Tabor, Roach and Bieski tied for third place. The Mountaineers earned their lone apparatus win of the evening on beam, outscoring the Nittany Lions, 48.475-48.2.

EAST LANSING, Mich. – The No. 21 West Virginia University gymnastics team tallied 191.225 points and finished third in its season-opening meet at Michigan State at Jenison Field House.

The No. 24 Spartans finished first with 193.925 points, while No. 11 Penn State finished second with 193.9 points. Western Michigan finished fourth with a score of 189.525.

WVU finished third on vault (48.325), third on bars (47.725), fourth on beam (46.3) and second on floor (48.875).

Junior Amy Bieski tallied 38.275 points and finished fifth overall. The Nanticoke, Pa., native eclipsed the 1,000-point plateau.

Bieski's classmate, Naja Johnson, was the lone Mountaineer to place in the top three, finishing first on bars with 9.85 points.

The Mountaineers opened the meet strong on floor, scoring 48.875 points and finishing the first rotation on top of the leader board. The Spartans sat next to WVU with a 48.875 showing on vault. The Nittany Lions earned 48.55 points on bars, while the Broncos sat in fourth place with 47.1 points.

Johnson and Bieski were the steadying force behind the Mountaineers' floor lineup, as each scored 9.825 and finished fourth overall. Sophomore Tina Maloney followed with a career-high score of 9.775, while senior Kiersten Spoerke scored 9.75 points.

WVU maintained its lead through two rotations, scoring 48.325 on vault and pushing its team total to 97.2. The Spartans tallied 47.95 on bars and sat in second with 96.825 points. The Nittany Lions remained in third place with 96.5 points after scoring 47.95 on beam, and the Broncos scored 48.125 on floor to bring their team total to 95.375.

Bieski paced WVU for the second-straight rotation and earned 9.75 points on vault, good enough for seventh place. Senior anchor Chelsi Tabor scored 9.7, and Maloney and freshman Alaska Richardson finished third for the team with matching 9.675 scores.

A 48.5 floor score pushed Penn State's team total to 145.0 and put the Nittany Lions in first place through three rotations. The Mountaineers slipped to second with 144.925 points following a 47.725 showing on bars. MSU scored 48.05 on beam and sat in third place with 144.875 points, while the Broncos totaled 47.1 on vault for a team total of 142.475.

Johnson, in her new role as the lineup anchor, had a career day on the bars, with the Austell, Ga., native's winning score of 9.85 matching a high she set as a sophomore. Bieski finished seventh overall with 9.675 points, and sophomore Nicole Roach followed with a 9.6.

The Spartans, with their home crowd behind them in the final rotation, scored 49.05 on floor and solidified their win. The Nittany Lions tallied 48.9 on vault, while the Mountaineers earned 46.3 on beam and the Broncos received 47.05 points on bars.

Spoerke pulled through for the Mountaineers on beam, anchoring the lineup and finishing sixth overall with a solid 9.6 score. Roach tallied 9.525 points in her first career action on the apparatus.

PITTSBURGH, Pa. - The No. 25 West Virginia University gymnastics team swept its competition and finished first with a score of 192.425 at the Pitt tri-meet at the Fitzgerald Field House.

Kent State placed second with 190.625 points, while the host Panthers finished third with a score of 190.55.

The meet was the season opener for Pitt and Kent State, and also served as the EAGL opener for the Mountaineers and the Panthers.

WVU was strong across the board in its victory and finished first on beam (47.775) and floor (48.625), and second on vault (48.5) and bars (47.525).

Junior Amy Bieski again paced the Mountaineers with a solid 38.05 all-around showing and finished third overall.

With a 48.625 floor score, the Mountaineers built an early lead for the second-consecutive meet and held the top spot through the first rotation. The Panthers stood in second with a 48.4 vault showing, while the Golden Flashes rounded out the trio with a 47.075 beam score.

Bieski paced a solid floor lineup with a meet-winning 9.775 score. Sophomore Tina Maloney finished in a close second with 9.75 points, while junior Naja Johnson tied for third place and earned 9.725 points.

The Mountaineers maintained their lead through two rotations after a 48.5 effort on vault pushed their team total to 97.125. Pitt tallied 47.775 on bars and remained in second with a 96.175 combined score, while KSU earned 47.75 on floor and stayed in third place with 94.825 points.

Senior Chelsi Tabor, the Mountaineers' vault anchor and the reigning EAGL champion, stuck her landing and scored 9.8, a one-tenth improvement on her season-opening score of 9.7. That score gave the Beckley, W.Va., native a share of first place, her first top three showing of the season. Bieski and freshman Alaska Richardson built up to Tabor's point total and scored consecutive 9.75 vaults, good enough for fourth place.

Despite scoring 47.525 on bars, the Mountaineers remained ahead of the pack through three rotations with an aggregate score of 144.65. The Golden Flashes netted 48.675 on vault and usurped the Panthers with a team score of 143.5. Pitt remained in the hunt, and with a 46.925 beam score, sat in third with a combined point total of 143.1.

Junior Emily Kerwin, in her first career action on bars, paced the Mountaineers with a 9.6 score and finished fifth overall. Senior Ashley Wilson opened the rotation with a season-high 9.575, and sophomore Nicole Roach placed third on the team with a 9.55.

WVU secured its meet victory in the fourth rotation with an inspired 47.775 beam showing. KSU tallied 47.125 on bars, and Pitt earned 47.45 on floor.

Reigning EAGL beam champion Shelly Purkat led an improved Mountaineer beam rotation with a second-place 9.725 showing. Roach, in only her second career meet on beam, scored 9.7 and tied for third place. Bieski finished in eighth place with a 9.65 showing.

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. – Junior Amy Bieski's efficient, solid day in the gym helped propel the West Virginia University gymnastics team to a season-high 194.0 score and a sweep of its home opener in front of 1,555 fans at the WVU Coliseum.

The Mountaineers defeated EAGL opponents No. 23-ranked NC State (193.225), Maryland (193.0) and George Washington (188.65).

The victory over the Wolfpack is WVU's first win over a ranked team this season. Additionally, since going 1-2 in their season opener at Michigan State, the Mountaineers have earned five-straight wins.

WVU's day included wins on vault (48.75) and beam (48.075). The team also finished second on bars (48.5) and floor (48.675). All but the floor score are season-high marks.

Bieski had a breakout meet in front of the home fans, placing in the top three on each event, including a bars win, and finishing first overall with 39.15 points.

Bieski's lone event win came in bars, as she scored a season-high 9.775 and tied NCSU's Taylor Seaman. Bieski also tied for second on vault (9.775) and beam (9.775) and tied for third on floor (9.825); each score is a season-best mark.

WVU relied on its No. 17-ranked floor lineup, as the team trailed the Terrapins 145.575-145.325 through three rotations. The Mountaineers pulled through, scoring 48.675 to UMD's 47.425 beam point total to secure the meet victory.

Following a shaky start, senior Kiersten Spoerke got the Mountaineers on track with a 9.725 score, while junior Stephanie Keaton followed with a career-best 9.75. Freshman Chelsea Goldschrafe proved tough under pressure in her first career floor performance, scoring 9.7 as a last-second replacement in the No. 5 slot and paving the way for Bieski's 9.825 performance.

WVU concluded the meet with a solid showing on floor and scored 48.7 points.

Bieski anchored the Mountaineers' lineup with a team-best 9.8 routine, good enough for sixth place overall. Purkat finished second on the team with 9.75 points, while Spoerke and Maloney tied for third place with 9.725 scores.
